INTRO:

- A. Smith's Bible Dictionary lists ten men in the Bible with the name "Joseph."
 - 1. Two of those ten had a father named "Jacob."
- B. The Joseph of our study is one we read about in Genesis 37-50, the son of Jacob and Rachel.
 - 1. Joseph is the first son of Jacob by Rachel.
 - 2. Jacob loved Rachel more than Leah (Genesis 29:30).
 - 3. Jacob loved Joseph more than his other children (Genesis 37:3).
 - a. Jacob made Joseph a coat of many colors.
 - 4. Joseph's brothers...(**Genesis 37:4**)
 - a. To make things worse, Joseph told his brothers two dreams he had.
 - 1) (Genesis 37:7)
 - 2) (Genesis 37:9)
- C. Joseph's life is filled with suffering, anguish, and sadness.
- D. Joseph is among those in the "Hall of Faith" **Hebrews 11:22**
- E. What are the lessons we can learn from Joseph?

I. DOING THE RIGHT THING DOESN'T ALWAYS MEAN THINGS WILL GO RIGHT!

- A. The jealousy, hatred, and resentment of Joseph's brothers led them to sell Joseph to the Ishmaelites/Arabian traders. (**Genesis 37:28**)
- B. In Egypt, the traders sold him to Potiphar, (**Genesis 37:36**).
- C. Joseph remained faithful and obedient to the commandments of God even in a strange land and because of this,... (**Genesis 39:2**).
- D. God's blessings helped Joseph to find favor with his master and eventually made him overseer of his house. However, the story doesn't end here.
- E. Potiphar's wife "casts longing eyes on Joseph" (**Genesis 39:7**) and seduced him to lie with her.
 - 1. This did not just happen once, but day after day until Potiphar's wife forced herself on Joseph as a last resort. She tried to force Joseph to lie with her but Joseph fled.
 - a. He always refused and did not give in to the seduction of his master's wife.
 - b. Genesis 39:9
- F. There are a lot of lessons from Joseph in Potiphar's house that we would do well to remember:
 - 1. Joseph did the right thing, but something good did not result, at least at the moment.
 - a. Potiphar's wife accused Joseph. (v. 17)
 - b. Potiphar's "anger was aroused" (v. 19) and he "put him into the prison," (v. 20).
 - 1) Joseph was imprisoned for doing the right thing.
 - 2, Life is unfair. But God is always fair.
 - a. This is the reality every Christian must face: Doing the right thing will not necessarily lead to a good outcome.
 - 3. Christ was perfect and did not commit a single sin.

- a. Yet, He suffered the most excruciating and agonizing death penalty man has ever conceived.
- 4. Being a Christian is not easy. However, God has this to say for those who will choose to faithfully follow Him: I Peter 2:19-21; Matthew 5:11-12
 - a. Following God and Christ is not always convenient.
 - 1) It will lead to difficulties and persecutions.
 - 2) It is only natural that we suffer during this lifetime.
 - b. Though our life as a Christian may be tough, we can all be assured that our reward will be worth it.

II. "ALL THINGS WORK TOGETHER FOR GOOD TO THEM THAT LOVE GOD," (ROMANS 8:28)

- A. Despite the events in Joseph's own house and in Potiphar's house, Joseph meets Pharaoh's chief butler and baker while in prison.
 - 1. They both have dreams and Joseph interprets the dreams for them.
 - a. The butler's dream meant he would be reinstated to Pharaoh's house while the baker would be hanged.
 - 2. Joseph told the butler to remember him to Pharoah, but instead of remembering Joseph, the butler forgot him. (Genesis 40:23).
 - So, after showing goodness to the butler, Joseph was again repaid with unkindness.
- B. When all hopes seem to fade, Pharaoh had a troubling dream no one was able to interpret.
 - 1. All of a sudden, the butler remembers Joseph and mentions him to Pharaoh.
 - a. Joseph's faith remained strong throughout the years of his stay in Egypt and he confirmed his faith to God by acknowledging Him to be the Supreme Giver of knowledge and wisdom.
 - 1) He said,...(**Genesis 41:16**).
 - 2. After interpreting Pharaoh's dream and suggesting a way to deal with the great famine that was soon to come upon Egypt, Pharaoh made this statement to Joseph for everyone to hear: **Genesis 41:39-41**
 - a. What a remarkable turn of event! Joseph, who was a prisoner, was suddenly turned into the most powerful ruler in the land of Egypt next to the Pharaoh!
 - b. Let us realize as Christians that no matter what happens in our lives, we can always have the confidence that God is in ULTIMATE control!
 - c. We can always trust the word of God. **Deuteronomy 31:6**
- C. Joseph's life is among the best examples on how God works out His plan.
 - 1. Though we might not understand the things that are now happening, we must have the faith that God will work all things for good!

III. THERE'S NO EXCUSE GOOD ENOUGH TO BREAK GOD'S COMMANDMENT!

A. Joseph, at a very young age, lost everything!

- B. Joseph could have all the reasons in the world to do what was right in his own eyes and forget God.
 - 1. He was betrayed by his brothers; sold to slavery;
 - Imprisoned after resisting the seduction of Potiphar's wife;
 - 3. Forgotten by the butler after interpreting his dreams.
- C. Joseph could have just made up one excuse after another and gave up.
- D. After all, he could have the best life there is in Egypt by compromising his godly principles.
 - 1. He is in a foreign land.
 - 2. His parents are away.
 - 3. No one would rebuke him for doing what was wrong.
 - 4. No one would hold him accountable for giving in to temptation.
 - 5. After years being in Egypt, he could have easily dismissed God as Someone who doesn't care.
- E. But Joseph's integrity and dedication to God kept him on the right track.
 - 1. If God's will is important to us, we'll find every reason to follow Him instead of making excuses.
- F. Joseph has all the excuses and reasons in the world to stop obeying God.
 - 1. How easy is it for us to break God's commandments?
 - 2. How easy is it for us to compromise and just give in to temptation?
 - 3. What's our excuse/excuses?
 - 4. What do we say to ourselves when we are rationalizing our sin?
- G. We need to come to a realization that there is really no excuse good enough for us to sin! Sin is sin!
 - 1. The moment we give in to temptation because of excuses, we are losing the opportunity to develop godly character and to show God that we can... (2 Peter 3:18)
 - 2. So, let us do away with all the excuses we might use. (**Hebrews 12:2**).

IV. LEARN TO DELAY GRATIFICATION.

- A. We need to overcome the temptation of instant gratification.
 - 1. We live in a world where we are bombarded with many opportunities of instant gratification.
 - a. Technological advances has made our lives easier to the point that we feel entitled to have all the good things in this life.
 - b. It seems that with just a simple push of a button, we can instantly have what we want.
- B. Since this world is geared towards the way of getting, we can easily see why this world has a serious lack of patience.
 - 1. Part of being faithful is being patient.
- C. Joseph knew this and he was very patient to wait for God's promise.
 - 1. He remembered his dream where God revealed unto him that he would rise to power.
 - a. Exactly when and how that would happen, he didn't know.

- b. All he and we need to know is that God never lies (Titus 1:2) and what God has promises, He is able to deliver (Isaiah 46:10).
- D. Joseph has learned the art of delayed gratification.
 - It's the process of denying ourselves the temporary and immediate pleasure that sin can give in order to have a greater joy and genuine blessedness in the presence of God.
 - 2. Instead of giving in to temptation, he "*left his garment in her hand, and fled and ran outside*" (Genesis 39:13).
 - a. Notice the determination of Joseph. He did not just walked away from temptation, but he "**FLED**" and "**RAN**"!
- E. What about us? Will we enjoy sin for just a brief moment or will we suffer now but enjoy God's full blessings for eternity?

CONCLUSION:

- A. The story of Joseph helps us to see how God works in the grand scheme of things.
- B. God knows every detail of our lives.
 - 1. He is our Father and like an earthly father, "no good thing will He withhold from those who walk uprightly" (Psalms 84:11).
- C. The lessons from Joseph's life are POWERFUL.
 - We need to remember that these lessons will be useless if we don't put it into practice.
- D. When Joseph makes himself known to his brothers, he said, "But now, do not therefore be grieved or angry with yourselves because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life... So now it was not you who sent me here, but God" (Genesis 45:5, 8).
- E. Joseph understood that all the events which had happened in his life were according to God's plan.
 - 1. We need to also have the faith that God has a plan for us and He is currently working with us.
 - 2. God is not yet done so let us be patient and faithful.
