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WHO CAN COME TO GOD?

"No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day It is written in the prophets, And they shall be all taught of God. Every man therefore that hath heard, and hath learned of the Father, cometh unto me." (John 6:44-45).

Who can come to God? He that "hath heard and hath learned of the Father." This idea of one falling down by his radio, or having some "miracle worker" lay his hands on him to be saved is a lot of foolishness. One must be taught of God before he can do what God would have him do. Hearing and learning are prerequisites of obedience to God. David prayed, "Teach me thy way, Oh Lord, and I will walk in thy truth." It is impossible for one to "walk in truth" with-

out some knowledge of truth. We do not mean to say that one must wait until he has a complete knowledge of the will of God before he becomes a Christian, but that he must know what God would have him as an alien sinner do in order to become a Christian.

Jesus said in Matt: 7:21 "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter the kingdom of heaven; But he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." One may cry, Lord, Lord, without any knowledge whatever of the will of God; but he cannot do the will of the Father; as the above verse says he must do; without some knowledge of what God's will is. How can one obey the traffic laws without some knowledge of such laws? He cannot do it. He is expected to learn such laws, then obey them. The same is true of the law of God. One must hear and learn, then obey.

Are You Willing To Search The Scriptures?

The writer of the Book of Acts commended the Bereans of old by saying: "These were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so." Acts 17:11). The Bereans who listened to the preaching of the apostle Paul, received the word with all readiness of mind. They were anxious to receive it. Their hearts indeed were receptive. However, before accepting the preaching of the apostle they obviously wanted to be sure that he was telling the truth of God. So they "searched the Scriptures daily." Luke later records the fact these Bereans were noble. Many people today are not characterized by this nobility. First, they aren't willing to receive the word with all readiness of mind and secondly, they aren't going to put the effort that is required to "search the Scriptures daily" to see whether or not the things that are spoken are so.

In 1 Peter 3:15 Peter exhorts us saying "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." We thus have the

responsibility of preparing and being willing to give an answer to those who may ask us concerning our hope. Some are prepared but are not willing to answer. Others are willing but are not prepared to answer. We will never be "ready" to answer as we should unless we "sanctify the Lord God in our hearts." We cannot "sanctify" the Lord in our hearts unless we are taught of God. If there is no knowledge, there can be no genuine faith since "faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." (Rom. 10: 17). We cannot have the knowledge and faith that will make us "ready to give an answer" unless we are willing to search the Scriptures.

The apostle Paul commanded Timothy saying: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Tim. 2:15). The idea of "giving diligence" is involved in "study." One must be zealous, yet cautious as he searches the Scriptures This requires a lot of time and much effort. Many will never be approved unto God, rightly dividing the word of truth because they are not willing to give the time nor put forth the effort required. Such ought to be ashamed! They will be lost in the day of judgment.

The fact that Paul shows that one should study in order to "rightly divide the word of truth" suggests that if one does not study that he will not divide aright God's word. Many people try to justify themselves in their ignorance of God's truth by saying: Educated men don't agree on the Bible. If they can't understand it and agree on it, there is no use in me trying to." Friends, you and I will not be judged on the basis of what educated men may have said about the Bible, but we will be judged by what the Bible teaches! You have the responsibility of searching the Scriptures, as did the Bereans of old, to see whether or not the things that are spoken are so! Paul warns that "evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived." (2 Tim. 3:13). Don't be deceived by others and do not de-

George W. Cornell, an Associated Press writer, quoted the above words of a New York Episcopalian leader, indicating that many denominationalists are beginning to see the emptiness of their efforts. This quote is printed here from an article by Robert Welch, from which the following are taken.

"The churches have kept adding odds and ends of new responsibilities until they resemble a modern drug store or shopping center." So opined a leader of the Yale Divinity School.

"The trouble is that the church has become a please-the-crowd institution instead of an unfettered champion of principle." And this is observed by a social scientist in the ultra-liberal University of Chicago.

The church is not in the recreational and social business. Some of the so-called "clergy" of high estate in sectarian quarters apparently see this and lament the wasted motion and perversion of mission it effects even in their human insituations. The preachers who are partyminded can say but little against the above, for no Scripture can aid them. and a goodly number of their associates make no pretenses that such is the mission of the church. Yet, they continue the parties-but be not surprised, for if men have no respect for God and His word, why should they honor their own scholarship?

Pitiful as this is, it cannot compare to the same practice on the part of those who claim to do only that which is authorized in God's Word.
